The Soko Fund is working to strengthen the healthcare workforce in Malawi

The Soko Fund supports women from poor families into higher education in Malawi, Central Africa, Started in 2004, the Soko Fund has enabled become teachers. women to engineers and agriculturalists, among many other professions. It has thereby generated for Malawi, and for these women, the benefits that come from internally educated professionals committed to the development of their country.

The Soko Fund currently provides scholarships for 55 students across 4 universities. Over more than a decade, with the help of University Deans, it has successfully identified talented students hindered by poverty, and enabled them to complete their degrees.

Over 70 Soko supported graduates are now working in a wide variety of sectors within Malawi.

Our aim was:

- To support 10 women studying for degrees in healthcare.
- To build a new network of support for graduates in the early stages of seeking employment – Soko Fund Graduate Association (SGA)
- To create a Job Centre using modern technology to enable information sharing about opportunities.
- To hold workshops for women who have graduated

What the project has achieved:

- 11 women accepted to study on healthcare courses
- The Soko Fund Graduate
 Association (SGA) was launched,
 offering a network of support for female graduates.
- a modern technology "Soko Fund Job Centre" established to enable women to find out about vacancies and to have support in making applications
- employment or training secured through the "Job Centre" for 22 graduates, who were previously unemployed.
- a workshop to support graduates to make job applications, develop their CVs and support for smallscale enterpreneurship (27th Oct 2017)
- a workshop on Cervical Cancer prevention (10th April 2018). The project is looking to work with this

- organization to develop a programme of peer support, using the SGA networks to reach young women in rural schools
- and a workshop supporting women in STEM careers (6th May 2018)
- an internship scheme initiated to support healthcare graduates in gaining much needed employment experience
- 2 healthcare graduates accepted as interns in First Aid Africa
- peer mentoring talks in local secondary schools by Soko Scholarship Graduates

This training has changed my thinking capacity. I can't just wait for an employment opportunity but I have to create my own. I have learnt that it's possible... and it begins with me.
