

Message from the Chair



I have now been in post as Chair of the Scotland Malawi Partnership for over a year and what a year it has been! Who could have imagined when I wrote the Chair's Introduction for the 2018-19 Annual report that we would have been unable to have face-to-face meetings for over half of the following year.

My comments here refer to the period from April 2019 to March 2020, ending just after the Covid-19 pandemic hit us and I can still say what a year it was!

Of many successful events, I must highlight two very special award events in the last quarter of 2019. Firstly, on 5th September it was a great honour and privilege to have our Hon Co-Patron, HRH The Princess Royal present our Annual Awards for 2019. The day was a celebration for all members who have an impact in Malawi and Scotland through thousands of people-to-people partnerships.

Secondly, our first ever School Partnerships Awards were held on 5th December with William Kamkwamba, the inspirational and innovative young man who was the focus of the film 'The Boy Who Harnessed The Wind'. To have William closely associated with the SMP was amazing and his own passion and long-term commitment was inspiring for the young people present.

In between these, on 5th October, 200 members came to our AGM, where we welcomed the then Minister for International Development Ben Macpherson MSP and. from Lilonawe. Lazarus Chiawandali, former street singer and current advocate for albinism through his music, and Dr Ann Phoya, the Chair of our sister network in Malawi. It was an extremely positive and re-affirming event, ensuring many new contacts and

bonds were forged and partnerships strengthened.

We launched our Year of Governance Strengthening in March 2020, at a reception in the City Chambers for the first female Speaker of the Malawi National Assembly, Hon. Catherine Gotani Hara and a group of Malawian MPs from three parties, who were part of long-standing inter-parliamentary working between Scotland and Malawi.

There have been two staff post changes this vear. Craig Docking joined the team as Member Administrative Officer in October 2019. Craig is the first point of contact for members, responsible for handling member data and overseeing events admin, and in his first year has made an enormous contribution to administrative systems. An important post for SMP is that of Media and Communications Officer. While Pamela Tulloch has been on maternity leave. there have been three postholders covering this work, Meghan Harvey, Douglas Coulter and Gemma Conley-Smith, who have all added much to the SMP.

We are indebted to the Scottish Government for

continuing its core funding to the SMP. Without it, we could not achieve what we do as a Members' organisation. Our triennial funding ended a few days after lockdown but we were pleased to receive confirmation from the Scottish Government that our core funding would be renewed for a further three years, albeit at a static level. In real terms, we will have to invest a bit more time in income generation if we are to maintain and extend these impressive achievements.

The Scotland Malawi Partnership is an inspirational organisation of which to be a member and I am delighted to be able to return the support I have had personally by being a Board and Sub-Committee member. One of the privileges of being Chair is to hear about the amazing work being done across so many areas through long-standing respectful partnerships with our friends in Malawi.

On the 5th September, the SMP was proud to host its <u>2019 Member Awards</u> ceremony, celebrating the impact our members are having through thousands of individual people-to-people partnerships between our two nations.

The ceremony was led by our Hon Co-Patron HRH The Princess Royal, who spoke passionately about the work of the SMP and the impact our members are having.

It was standing room only, with all 150 places quickly selling out, and a fantastic energy on the day.

The Princess expressed how encouraged she is by the strength of the two-way relationship, in which both Scotland and Malawi benefit, reflecting that member organisations are comprised of 'individuals

who have a really good understanding of what they are trying to achieve'.

Not only were there four formal awards, but also special commendations to 10 other SMP member organisations which had responded quickly and effectively to the devastating impact of Cyclone Idai.

The day was a celebration for all members who have an impact in Malawi and Scotland, through the thousands of people-to-people partnerships.

To all of you who have been involved, I think you have set a standard, and I hope what today will do is to allow other partners to recognise that there is an area here in which they can improve upon and that is linking in with more individuals who have the potential to make a real difference.

Language and culture

The SMP ran Chichewa language courses in Glasgow in May, and Edinburgh in June, to a diverse range of different members soon to visit Malawi.

Our Malawian and Scottish tutors covered introductions, basic cultural points, and useful language for those visiting Malawi for the first time. The lessons were largely conversational, helping attendees to feel confident in using what they learnt outside of the classroom.

Members received a special new language resources booklet and audio files to help them practise after the course finished.

Business, Trade and Tourism

The SMP continued to play a crucial role helping co-lead the Malawi-UK Business Group through 2019, offering specific support with advocacy work to support business, trade, investment and tourism.

The Partnership and Scotland's International Development Alliance were delighted to co-host a roundtable meeting with CDC's Chairman, Graham Wrigley and Head of Global Affairs, Andrew Palmer, who were keen to meet Members to understand their development priorities.

CDC is the UK's development finance institution, wholly owned by the UK Government's Department for International Development.

The meeting presented an opportunity for those with key business, investment, trade and tourism links with Scottish civic society's international partners, to foreground the importance of significant and sustainable investment, and to hear from CDC.

Youth and Schools

Perhaps the most important and successful area of work for the Partnership continues to be its engagement of schools and young people.



More than 250 Scottish schools are members of the SMP, many of which have active links with Malawi.

The Youth and Schools Manager, Gemma Burnside met with school groups through the year as part of their links, and to help prepare for visits to Malawi. In total, there were more than 100 points of support and engagement of Scottish school, with over **46,000 young Scots benefitting** from the SMP's support and outreach in the year.

There were dozens of SMP events engaging young people through the year, for example:

On the 28th May the SMP supported a youth-led Malawi Celebration Day at the Ninewells Community Garden. The event was jointly organised by students from the University of Dundee's Global Health Partnerships society and NHS

Tayside, with local school pupils helping plant seeds in the new garden and learn more about their new school partnerships.

On 30th May the SMP supported a **Beath High School Malawi lunch**, with students and teachers in the school's Malawi partnership group sharing Malawian culture and food with 50

guests including local councillors, parents, teachers and pupils.

On 20th June the SMP supported the <u>St</u>

Youth and Schools

On the 5th December, the SMP hosted its first ever <u>Schools</u>
<u>Partnership Awards Ceremony</u>, with William Kamkwamba, the real life 'Boy Who Harnessed the Wind'.

The Awards, kindly supported by the Year of Young People National Lottery fund, Orbis Expeditions and the David Livingstone Birthplace Project, celebrated the variety of school partnerships with Malawi across Scotland.

Focusing on the theme of sustainability, our Youth Committee judges were looking for schools to tell us the story of their partnership – where it has come from and where it is going.

We asked schools to be as creative as they liked! It could be in any format as long as it was based around the theme of sustainability and we encouraged schools to think about using the Partnership Principles as a way of reflecting on their partnership as well.

Member Forums

Through the year we continued to have regular Member Forums: bringing members together to share their learning and experience, to listen to partners in Malawi, and support collaborative working.

On the 3rd December, the SMP's Renewable Energy Forum met to welcome William Kamkwamba ('The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind'). William's inspiring story and fantastic vision helped bring stakeholders together to share information about their Scotland-Malawi renewable energy work and build exciting new collaborations.

On the 14th February, the SMP's **Further** & **Higher Education Forum** met to launch the 2020 edition of its 'Directory of Scotland-Malawi Further and Higher

Education Links'. Universities and colleges across Scotland and Malawi were actively involved in this updated publication which is helping to coordinate the many FE/HE links between the two countries.

On the 26th February, the **Governance Forum** met to design the SMP's 'Year of Governance Strengthening'. It then met again just two weeks later to greet the Speaker of the Malawian National Assembly, and a Commonwealth Partnership for Development delegation of more than a dozen Malawian MPs, to discuss Governance Strengthening.

The SMP worked closely with the Malawian National Assembly in 2019-20.

First, we welcomed the First and Second Deputy Speakers, organising a roundtable for them to meet SMP Members and connect them with MSPs and Scottish MPs.

Then, we helped support two separate Malawian National Assembly delegations taking place at the same time. Catherine Gotani Hara, the first female Speaker of the Malawi National Assembly, led one delegation, joined by Fiona Kalemba, Clerk of Parliament, and three Parliamentary officials. The second was a Commonwealth Partnership for Development delegation of more than

a dozen other Malawian MPs, from three of the largest political parties in Malawi. The SMP brought them both together, organising meetings in Scotland and Westminster, hosting a major roundtable meeting as part of the 'Year of Governance Strengthening' and a civic reception with the Lord Provost of Edinburgh and SMP Members.

All these delegations are part of a longstanding inter-parliamentary relationship between Scotland and Malawi, which aims to strengthen both parliaments through sharing and capacity building.

Holyrood:

The Partnership continued to help lead the Scottish Parliament's Malawi Cross Party Group, with three formal meetings of the Group in 2019-20.

On the 1st May, the Malawi CPG met to hear from two **health projects** in Malawi funded by the Scottish Government's Malawi Development Programme, with talks by Angus Loudon, the Chief Executive Officer at St John Scotland, and Mike McKirdy, Professional Advisor for the Scottish Global Health Co-ordination Unit.

On the 11th September, the CPG welcomed the **first Malawian veterinary students** to graduate from the new Veterinary School in Malawi, supported by Scotland. The group's Head of Department, Professor Tefera Melaku from Lilongwe University of Agriculture and Natural Resources (LUANAR), spoke at the CPG, with some of the 12 students participating in a Q&A. Several of the vets then gave moving testimony of their route to gaining a place to study as part of the first cohort of vets to graduate from LUANAR and what their ambitions for the future are.

On the 19th February the Malawi CPG met to discuss **education and community** engagement projects and partnerships with Malawi. The Malawi Country Director, Harold Kuombola, and International Programme Manager, Kate Sykes, from Link Community Development briefed the group on their work providing support and training for government staff,



district education officers, communities and schools to support more effective teaching, improved school management and increased community engagement.

Through the year we convened regular informal cross party engagements in Holyrood, including meetings with **William Kamkwamba**, the Chair of CDC and others.





The SMP was also active in Westminster and Whitehall (although no Scottish Government funds were used for this work). We provided the Secretariat for the Malawi All-Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) which continued to be active through the year.

The APPG's greatest achievement in 2019-20 was to partner with the APPG for Migration and the APPG for Africa, to conduct a major all-party parliamentary looking at the way those from Africa are treated when they apply for a UK Visa. This has been a longstanding issue for SMP members and their partners, and we are pleased to continue to represent these concerns in Westminster.

As part of the Inquiry, the APPGs met with the UK Immigration Minister and the UK's Independent Chief Inspector of Immigration, took public evidence and received submissions from across the UK and Africa. On the 16th July the APPGs came together to launch its all party report, presenting its concerns directly to the Immigration Minister and 60 representatives across civic society.

Accounts

The work of the Scotland Malawi Partnership is funded primarily from grants, membership fees and voluntary donations.

Income

A total of **£491,695** was received in 2019-20, comprising:

- £242,536 core funding from Scottish
 Government for the SMP's core operations
- £109,482 funding from the Scottish
 Government for the development of MaSP
- £80,768 of restricted income received for MaSP for other activities
- £9,527 of restricted funding received for SMP from various sources
- £29,382 Unrestricted fund, including subscriptions, donations and others
- £20,000 received for MaSP to carry out safeguarding training amongst its members

Expenditure

A total of **£500,323** was expended in 2019-20. The largest areas of expenditure were:


- £201,620 for SMP employment costs including salaries and wages of £173,376 and oncosts including employers NIC £16,225 and employers pension £8,825
- £239,764 for MaSP development including the Scottish Government core grant and safeguarding grants
- £20,673 was spent on events and operational matters

Bank balance


It should be noted that some income streams are not received annually and a direct comparison of income and expenditure within a 12-month period therefore only gives a part of the picture. At the end of the financial year 2019-20, the Scotland Malawi Partnership had the following funds in the bank: restricted balance £28,653 and unrestricted £106,361.

Message from our Chief Executive:

2019-20 was another fantastic year in the story of the Scotland Malawi Partnership.

Members, staff, volunteers and the Board came together to achieve amazing things and I am hugely grateful to all who made the year a success. We had more and larger events than ever before, finding ever more innovative ways of bringing members together to support networking, shared learning and collaboration.

The Member Awards with HRH The Princes Royal, the School Partnership Awards with William Kamkwamba, and our AGM with Lazarus, were just a few of the wonderful highlights for me. This report brings back many happy memories of the SMP at its best.

It is impossible to talk about 2019-20 with noting that the year ended with the beginning of the Covid-19 crisis, a crisis threatening both our nations.

The small SMP staff team moved quickly and effectively into home-working and, with the Board, we quickly agreed a thorough Covid-19 Risk Register and a strategic Covid-19 Response Strategy, with four core strands: continuity, support, innovation and inspiration. On 31st March, the last day of the year covered in this report, we had the first in what has become a series of high-impact nation-to-nation Covid Coordination meetings on Zoom.

The SMP has often been praised for its agility and innovation, and the spirit of

partnership and collaboration which underpins its work. Never before has this been more important than in our work helping fight Covid-19 with our members.




At the point of writing, more than 250 organisations and key individuals, in both countries, have tapped into the SMP's Covid support services, 94% rating these as 'excellent' or 'very good', and 95% saying these have helped strengthen their Covid response. We are promoting twenty separate Scotland-Malawi covid appeals, with many having far exceeded their targets thanks to the SMP's promotion and support.

At times of change and challenge, it is important to remember what we hold above all else. We stand for an approach to international development underpinned by solidarity, mutual respect and mutual understanding. We believe in the inspiring power and impact of civic society: schools, churches, universities, hospitals, community groups, NGOs, and businesses all working together for one collective effort. And we believe that through these myriad people-to-people and community-to-community links, we can effect real and lasting positive change.

We will continue to champion these core values in the months and years ahead, and we believe while there may be further change and challenge, the next 160 years in our friendship with Malawi will only see the bilateral relationship grown and deepen.
