## Laura McGeorge:

In September 2015, seventeen young people and I from St Mungo's Academy and Eastbank Academy, along with our five leaders headed off to Blantyre, Malawi for a whirlwind two week experience. For the past year we have been on a leadership program, the aim of our MYLOL program was to make a difference in Malawi and in our own local communities in Glasgow. Before we went to Malawi we did various projects and events in our local area to try and improve some of the issues in our local community and we went over to Malawi to try and do the same.

While in Malawi we worked with two of our partner primary schools: Chilimoni and Catholic Institute. During our two weeks, our aim was to deliver sports and community development sessions to the children in standard 4, 5 and 6. We did this alongside our 'Malawian MYLOLs', this was 10 young people from each school who had been on a similar journey as us and we worked together to deliver sports leadership sessions within the school.

Working with the Malawian children was so much fun! We learned so many games and activities from the children and being able to teach some of the games that we play was amazing as the children from each year group where so much fun and so enthusiastic! Our aim was to teach sport sessions so that when we left the sessions would be able to continue and they would have a diverse range of activities that they now were able to play.

We also delivered community leadership sessions - In these lessons we worked on perceptions and how to change them, it was so interesting to learn from the Malawians the perceptions that they had on us and our culture and we also found out so much about Malawi and its culture that we didn't know before.

During our time in Malawi we got the chance to work with Mary's meals and a local youth centre. Both of these experiences were amazing and something we will all never forget! We visited a primary school where we got to help make and serve the porridge to the children and as well as thing we had the amazing job of giving each child in the school a Mary's Meals backpack - The reactions and gratefulness from the children that day are something that i will never forget, it was such an overwhelming but positive day.

At Bangwe Youth Centre, we worked with the Malawians there to paint our own little masterpiece on the walls there. We worked together to paint it and one wall we painted the Malawi and Scotland flag and on the other we put all of our hand prints on it and painted our quote: "If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together." This is a quote that we have been using for our project and it definitely describes the partnership between Scotland and Malawi as without working together, we would never be able to learn so much from each other as together we greater.
